
"I don't care if you're dead Jesus is here, and he wants To resurrect somebody."

The first time I attempted to read through the Bible in middle school, I was shocked by the things I found. At times it seemed like the Bible I was reading was a different thing entirely from what I heard preached on Sundays. At times the Bible I was reading seemed far from book of love I'd thought it was. What are we to do with these difficult passages? Should we pretend they don't exist, or hide them away?

One of my most powerful lessons about how to read the Bible actually came from a class that wasn't directly about the Bible. In a class I took on John Wesley, I remember reading one of Wesley's sermons to which many of my classmates reacted negatively. It was called, "The Causes of the Inefficacy of the Gospel." In the sermon Wesley slams Catholics and "Mahometans" (Muslims). My classmates who were uncomfortable with this sermon thought that Wesley was being bigoted and perpetuating hate through the sermon. However, after speaking ill of other faith traditions, Wesley goes on to make the argument that the Methodists listening to him are even worse than the Catholics and


Muslims. What Wesley is doing is speaking to a very particular audience, Methodists, and he's using their pre-existing prejudices to convict them of their need to live differently. Wesley knew little about Muslims, and in other sermons Wesley speaks very highly of the faith of some Catholics. The point of the sermon is not to insult other faith traditions. It is to convict people of his own. It can be challenging for us to understand Wesley and others when we no longer share the same perspectives and prejudices of their original audience.

This realization with regards to Wesley's writing affected the way I read the Bible as well. This semester I've been taking a class on Jeremiah. Much of Jeremiah's language can be very harsh with regard to women. Judah is pictured as an adulterous woman, and the descriptions are far from flattering. Taken one way, Jeremiah and God can seem derogatory, even abusive toward the feminine. However, our circumstances have changed significantly from the people Jeremiah originally addressed. The book of Jeremiah would have been written for and read almost exclusively by men; men who were a part of a very sexist society. The book of Jeremiah would have shamed these sexist men by using their own prejudices against them. It would have shamed them for not doing things that were actually positive for women (like caring for widows). That doesn't change the fact though that these passages present a challenge for us in our current context. As we seek to counteract sexism in our society, how can we relate to passages that in their time may have benefited women but that now, when misread, can perpetuate wrongs against women? The first step is to work to understand the context of scripture. Study Bibles can be helpful

for that. Sunday School classes often explore context, and sermons frequently explore the context of scripture. This knowledge will help you to understand not just the words, but the ways they may have been intended. This knowledge is essential so that we can work to proclaim the intent rather than rhetoric of the Bible.

I've been speaking in this example primarily about sexism in the book of Jeremiah, but what I'm saying applies to a wide variety of topics and books of the Bible. How we should understand militarism in the Bible is another particularly challenging question for me, but I believe that many of the same observations I've made above apply here as well.

Everyone I know who reads the Bible eventually comes across passages that they don't like. I've found that not ignoring these passages but rather seeking them out and wrestling with them individually and with others allows scripture to work in our lives. By only reading what we like and what we think we know, we can become stagnant. By studying what we don't understand, God can teach us and grow us. Our understandings of scripture will certainly change, and in many cases, our engagement with scripture will change us as people for the better.
