Also, I plan to suggest at the church council meeting that the church have quarterly fellowship between the two worship services. I have noticed that there is rarely a chance for attendees of each service to have mutual fellowship. Every three months, we could meet between worship services and have fellowship. On that specific Sunday,

there would be no Sunday School or Bible study between worship services. We could focus on fellowship itself. If people like this idea, soon the church will make an official announcement.

Then on February 18th, the church hosted a joint Ash Wednesday service with Queens Chapel UMC. This was my first time to meet with the church members from Queens Chapel. I know that the joint Ash Wednesday service is a tradition. I really enjoyed it, and I will continue to have the joint Ash Wednesday service with Queens Chapel UMC.

Additionally, I am looking forward to having a joint Sunrise Service with St. John's Episcopal Church on Easter morning. This will be another good opportunity to have ecumenical worship.

Soon, the church will have the traditional Holy Thursday and Good Friday services just before Easter. I will follow the traditional format of the church. In addition to that, though, I would like to try a new service on Good Friday. It is called "Stations of

the Cross." It will involve carrying the cross to various places in the community and reflecting on the last seven words of Jesus. Through this event, I hope to encourage the community to join in observing the passion and death of Jesus. It will start at 10:30 am at Panera Bread. Ministering to the Incarcerated — Kairos Inside by Deaconess Jane Grays

Kairos believes that true rehabilitation starts with the "heart". With this in KAIROS INSIDE mind, our ministry to incarcerated men and women begins with the Kairos weekend, where volunteers model and communicate God's unconditional love,

grace, and mercy. It is here that God begins changing hearts. A key outcome of the Kairos weekend is for participants to find hope and a new vision for their life through a relationship with God.

The prison environment fosters isolation. During the weekend, many participants take their first steps in learning to become vulnerable with one another. Following the weekend, they are encouraged to be involved in small groups focusing on accountability, encouragement, and prayer. Those groups meet weekly, and Kairos volunteers return to provide discipleship and mentoring. God continues to change hearts and transform lives as the participants strengthen their relationship with Christ and with each other. They grow in their understanding that, with God's help, a changed way of life is possible. As their transformation continues, new attitudes are expressed in changed behavior. Soon, they are impacting the world in which they live—inside the prison walls or outside upon their release.

Our Goals:

- To change hearts and transform lives by sharing God's love, grace, and mercy with those who feel
- To encourage involvement in small groups where participants can be uplifted and loved.
- To provide continuing mentoring and discipleship to those who are new in Christ.
- To minister to prison employees as well as the incarcerated.
- To support the prison chaplain.

The slogan of Kairos, Changing Hearts, Transforming Lives, Impacting the World, is the essence of what Kairos does.

Changing Hearts

During the initial Kairos weekend, Kairos volunteers serve as God's instrument through which his love, grace, and mercy are expressed to the participants/guests in a real and profound way. God begins changing hearts.

Transforming Lives


Following their weekend experience, participants/guests are encouraged to take responsibility for their life choices and their relationship with God; they are invited to engage in small accountability groups. Kairos volunteers return monthly to provide mentoring and guidance through these accountability groups. It is here that Kairos participants/guests begin to replace old ways of thinking with new ones, and learn that they are not alone on this journey. They realize that there is hope for a future. The prison environment begins to change and family relationships start to heal.......God is transforming lives.

Impacting the World

As the Kairos community inside a prison grows and begins to gain influence, incidents of violence decrease. When incarcerated participants are released, they re-enter the outside world with a Godcentered perspective and focus on becoming productive citizens. Female family members find support, strength, and encouragement. Youthful offenders acquire new God-centered values and change their direction in life. Families are reunited with a hope for the future.

We need to remember that the mind is like a parachute; it works best when open.

Come to the Planning Retreat!

Last November, many of you made pledges to financially support Emmanuel with your tithes and gifts. The Church Council thanks you all for your faithfulness in giving. The majority of the funds goes to cover basic expenses – staff payments and payroll taxes, utilities in the Sanctuary and Education buildings, building and equipment repairs, the mortgage on the parsonage, etc. The question that the Council has been grappling with in recent months is – How should we use "discretionary" money not required for a mandatory expense? Should we strengthen our Christian education program? Expand our programs for the needy? Strengthen the youth program? Or should we use it to seek out the "unchurched" and share with them the love of God? There are no easy answers, because potential uses far outweigh available funds.

To help us find answers, Emmanuel will have a church planning retreat on Saturday, May 9th, 9 am – 1 pm. Chris Owens from the conference will facilitate the meeting to help us stay "on topic" and accomplish our goals, and we will meet off-site at University United Methodist Church (3621 Campus Drive, College Park) to reduce distractions. The purpose of the retreat is to talk about what we would like Emmanuel to focus on in coming months. What should our goals and priorities be? Where should we direct our resources? How might we increase our resources?

The answers to these questions will affect everyone worshiping at Emmanuel. So please join us on May 9th and be part of the conversation!


