Hallelujah! I greet you in the name of Jesus Christ!

These days, we can feel the change of season. Summer is dwindling and fall is approaching us. I ask you to take care of your health during the transition. The body is always vulnerable to the change of season.

In September, we witnessed many people suffering from natural disasters. When we watched them, we felt helpless. As an expression of our concern and to help the victims, we collected two special offerings for people in Texas, Florida, and Sierra Leone. Church members were generous. Emmanuel forwarded the special offerings to UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) to be used for these people in need. I ask you to continue to pray for these people, who have lost their homes, family members, friends, and belongings.

I believe that the prayers and special offerings were the most meaningful church ministry during September.

Emmanuel has many activities and events scheduled during October. World Communion Sunday will be October 1st. Emmanuel traditionally invites people to read the Bible in different languages on this day. On October 15th, we will celebrate Laity Sunday. The annual Blessing of the Animals also will be on October 15th, at 2 pm at the church. Emmanuel's Church Conference will be October 25th. On October 21st, Emmanuel will host a memorial service for Maxine Norris. We will observe Reformation Sunday on October 29th. All Saints Sunday will be November 5th. Please support and pray for these worship services and church activities.

A couple of weeks ago, I preached on the Ten Commandments. I would like to share an illustration I used in that sermon for those who did not hear it.

In the June 2011 issue of National Geographic, there was an interesting article about religion, entitled "The Birth of Religion." Here's a summary of the main points in that article.

At Gobekli Tepe in southern Turkey, archaeologists have found the oldest known temple, built around 11,600 years ago. The temple is nine miles from the place where the prophet Abraham is supposed to have been born. Perhaps Abraham went to the temple, or passed by it.

Archaeologists believe that there was a change in the environment around that time. The Ice Age ended, bringing a gradual warming. People began to cultivate plants and domesticate animals. As a result, agriculture developed. Civilization blossomed suddenly, as well. People began to change their way of life, transitioning from hunters to farmers, and from nomads to settlers.

People began settling in villages. As the population living in villages grew, conflicts, tensions, and competition among people inevitably occurred. Society needed social norms or rules which everyone in society ought to keep to maintain social harmony. Therefore, religion arose to promote social cooperation. Religion provided people with individual and social ethical guidelines.

This information helps us understand the story of the Ten Commandments better. There were around two million Israelites living in the wilderness after the Exodus. Because they had been enslaved for generations, they had no specific rules, laws, written norms, policies or regulations to guide their behavior. It is likely that conflicts, tensions, and/or competition arose among them. The Israelites needed rules to control their big community.

God became aware of their need. Three months after the exodus began, God inscribed guidelines on two stone tablets and gave the tablets to Moses on Mount Sinai. Moses conveyed the guidelines to Israel. These now are known as the Ten Commandments.

This month, please read the Biblical account of the Ten Commandments, including why they were given to the Israelites and their meaning.

Again, please take care of yourself during the transition of season and continue to participate, support and pray for various ministries of the church.

If you have extra supplies that you would be willing to donate, it would help reduce the expense of this project. I would gladly accept money donations to purchase needed items, also. A collection container for items will be available in narthex for the next month or so.



First Aid Items That Are Needed


Absorbent dressings – 5” x 9”
 Band aids - Assorted sizes and shapes
 1” Adhesive tape
 Scissors - tiny or child size
 Antibiotic & Hydrocortisone ointment - new individual packs or small tubes
 Antiseptic (alcohol) wipes
 Aspirin - new individual wrap pack
 One-way valve breathing barriers
 Instant cold compress
 3” & 4” gauze roller bandage
 3” x 3” and 4” x 4” sterile gauze pads
 Triangle bandages – cotton
 Tweezers
 Thermometers - oral non-glass/non-mercury
 Covers for thermometers - sold separately

It also would be advisable to have a small lap blanket like airlines give out for the van. Pocket-size first aid books would be nice, too. Should someone have an extra first aid plastic box, it would be appreciated, even if it needs supplies.

I would suggest that if you haven't taken a First Aid or CPR course, you should do so. Time is important in life-or-death situations, and you may find yourself in a situation where EMS cannot respond quickly enough. They are offered at hospitals and other locations. Check with the American Heart Association and Red Cross for classes near you. Be Prepared! Thank you for your support!



Jerusha was the daughter of Zadok, who was a priest during David's reign. She became the wife of King Uzziah, who died a leper. She bore a son, Jotham, who became king of Israel at the age of 25 and reigned in Jerusalem for 16 years. The household must have been a godly one, because the Bible says that Jotham "did that which was right in the sight of the Lord" and that he "became mighty, because he prepared his ways before the Lord."

'Jerusha/Jerushah' means 'possession.'

If it rains, it will be held inside the church building. Everyone who loves animals is welcome! If you have a pet, please bring the animal and have him/her blessed at the service. Just make sure that dogs are leashed, and that cats and smaller animals are caged or otherwise restrained.

Animal blessing is a special ceremony conducted in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures. St. Francis considered animals to be his brothers and sisters, saying, "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures." For many persons, their pet is like a member of their family. Animals experience emotions such as happiness, love, fear, or loneliness just like people do. They also build close emotional bonds with human beings.

In addition to the influence of St. Francis of Assisi, one can find a good example of animal blessing in the Bible. When the earth was about to be flooded, God asked Noah to build the ark and put pairs of animals in it. The animals and Noah's family were able to start a new world together. This shows us that human beings are intended to coexist with the companionship of animals. God created the world in a way that allows human beings to live together with animals. In this sense, animal blessing is justifiable biblically and theologically.

At the Blessing of the Animals service, it will be great to see the animals and the people who love them. Through this event, I hope that the love for animals will be amplified throughout the community. I'm looking forward to it.


Let me conclude with the Franciscan prayer of animal blessing:



Standing with Puerto Rican church after hurricanes

United Methodists were praying and standing in solidarity with Puerto Ricans while awaiting word about the effects of Hurricane Maria. The Category 4 hurricane left Puerto Rico without power, with major building and infrastructure damage and a staggering amount of rain — about 30 inches in some areas.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference has a covenant relationship with the Methodist Church in Puerto Rico. The conference will be accepting monetary donations to help stricken residents of Puerto Rico. “We feel with the people of Puerto Rico and in a special way with the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico,” Thomas Kemper, top executive of the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries, told United Methodist News Service. “Bishop Héctor (Ortiz Vidal) is our board member and we have a number of Global Ministries missionaries and their families serving in Puerto Rico. We pray for their safety and stand in solidarity as one Methodist family.”

In a Sept. 21 message to United Methodist Communications, Ortiz said the destruction was “immense” and communications difficult. “We do not know yet the damage that our churches suffered,” the bishop wrote. “I live in a sector that is isolated and blocked right now. I am working together with my neighbors in removing debris from the blocked roads and I trust some time it will be open. But we are alive and we are standing in the fight. With the strength of God’s hope, we will rebuild Puerto Rico again.”

Reached on Sept. 20 through a Facebook message, Paloma Rodriguez Rivera, a youth leader in the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico, said she believed there were many homes that had been flooded or “completely destroyed” by the hurricane-force winds but didn’t know what areas had been affected most by Maria. “It is a miracle that I have internet because most people don’t,” wrote the San Juan resident. “I see that a lot of people don’t know anything about their family and they are desperate in the diaspora.”

This is the second of a tropical storm one-two punch for Puerto Rico. Hurricane Irma brushed by Puerto Rico on Sept. 6, leaving more than a million people without power but not the widespread damage that has resulted from Hurricane Maria.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief “is praying along with others” for the safety of people in Puerto Rico, said Catherine Earl, the agency’s director of U.S. disaster response and partner relations. “We know that there are many people here on the mainland that have family and friends and other missional connections to Puerto Rico and the people of Puerto Rico,” she added. Through the church and other partners — including National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster — and governmental connections such as FEMA, UMCOR can be part of a coordinated response in Puerto Rico when relief work begins, Earl said.

Kemper said UMCOR staff already had reached out to the Methodist Church in Puerto Rico regarding response and recovery. In a letter written to Kemper as Irma was headed to the island, the Puerto Rican bishop asked The United Methodist Church for prayers and solidarity. At that point, the Puerto Rican church had been in contact with 100 churches, including those on Vieques, Culebra and St. Croix of the U.S. Virgin Islands.

“We have oriented them in following the necessary steps to prepare for this atmospheric event,” he continued. “We have put in place an emergency system to work in the aftermath of the event. Nevertheless, there is not enough preparation for this type of hurricane.

“We are requesting the United Methodist Church for your prayers and your solidarity during this difficult time,” the bishop wrote. “Knowing that people outside of our area are praying for us gives us faith and courage.”

Purpose of the Ministry: The purpose of serving as an usher at Emmanuel United Methodist Church is to praise God by assisting with the details of worship. Serving as an usher is a sacred responsibility, for in many instances an usher is one of the first persons that visitors will have the opportunity to meet.

Objective:

- To help both visitors and members feel welcome.

Responsibilities:

- Pray for the worshipers and for yourself before you arrive.
- Arrive at the worship service thirty minutes before the service begins.
- Remain at your station until after the worship service has begun.
- Be alert to persons who arrive late and need a bulletin.
- Greet worshipers warmly.
- Assist worshipers in finding seats.
- Meet the needs of the physically challenged, which may mean asking someone to move if you need to make room for a wheelchair or walker.
- Close all doors when the worship service begins.
- Alert the Pastor if anyone needs to have communion brought to them in the pew.
- Direct people as necessary to the nursery, classrooms, restrooms, and other facilities.
- Assist people in a calm manner if there is an emergency.
- Open the sanctuary doors after the benediction.
- Provide an activities package for young children.
- Advise parents that they may use the rocking chair in the back of the sanctuary.

CHURCH ARCHITECTURE, Part 2

In the June issue of The Lamplighter, I noted that the shape of a church depends on the prevailing culture and the period of history in which it was built. There are two basic shapes – crosses and domes. This month, I will cover the different sections of a church.

Every part of a church is meant to remind the worshiper not only of the presence of God, but also of the worshiper’s responsibility. Each section of a church has a special name and a special purpose. The **narthex** developed from the open porch of early churches, and is located at the western end of the building. This was the worship area for penitents, those who had not been baptized, and confirmation students. In early churches, the baptismal font was located in the narthex, because no one could come into the main worship area until he or she had been baptized. You could call this area a hallway, vestibule, foyer or lobby, but those terms are secular and do not designate the room as a special sacred place.

The narthex is important to church designers and to church-goers because it allows the worshiper to shift from the secular to the sacred. It is a gathering place for individuals to become a group of worshipers. Visitors get their first impression of a church from the narthex. Does it make them aware they are in a church? Is there information about the church and its activities displayed? Is the narthex decorated nicely? Does it show that the members care about their church?

From the narthex, the worshiper goes into the **Nave**. “Nave” is a Latin word meaning "ship." The ship was an early Christian symbol for the church sailing through the world, similar to Noah's ark. Many Scandinavian churches have ships suspended from the ceiling over the congregation. You can see one in the chapel at the Naval Academy in Annapolis. The nave is for the baptized worshipers.

If the church is shaped like a cross, the cross piece is called the **Transept**. In large churches, it contains more pews. Emmanuel does not have a transept.


The **Choir** area is located after the transept and before the sacred area. The singers sit in stalls and assist in the service.

In medieval churches, the **Chancel** area was reserved for the clergy and the High Altar. (Large churches had several altars). The High Altar was located on the east end of the church.

The **Apse** is a semi-circular recess containing the altar. Emmanuel does not have an apse.

The altar is located in the **Sanctuary**. This is a sacred place. In medieval times, if someone was wanted by the King's men, he could go to the church (if he could get there), go to the altar and ask for sanctuary from the church. If the church consented, that person would be safe until he could get a fair trial.

Today, churches are shaped like fans, circles, and squares, with spires, flat roofs or sail-shaped roofs. Although some of the older designations may no longer apply, they are all sacred places, and there should be no confusion about that when anyone enters YOUR church.


