October 16 is Laity Sunday. We will recognize the commitment and dedication of laity.

October 26 is Reformation Sunday. We will remember the heritage and spirit of Martin Luther, who stood up against injustice. (See item on page 5.)

On November 2, we will have All Saints Sunday, in which we will remember our loved ones who have passed away and gone to their permanent home. If you have a loved one in your heart whom you have lost and still miss, please come and remember the person at the service.

As we face the change of seasons, I ask you to stay well and keep warm. Please take care of yourself in terms of body, mind, and spirit. Please keep supporting and praying for the church and its ministry, because it is the body of Christ.

## REFORMATION SUNDAY

Reformation Sunday, in the United States, falls on the Sunday before Oct. 31 (Halloween).

It is a civic holiday in some states in Germany. Reformation Sunday is celebrated in the Lutheran Church and other reformed church communities. The Religious reformation in Germany affected all European countries to some degree. It is not usually observed in the Methodist church because our heritage is Church of England and John Wesley lived 250 years after Martin Luther.

Martin Luther(1483-1546) was a German friar, Catholic priest, and professor of theology at the University of Wittenberg. Luther had for some time questioned some of the beliefs and practices of his church. The tipping point came in 1516 when Johann Tetzel, a Dominican friar and representative of the Pope came to Germany to sell indulgences to raise money to rebuild St. Peter's Basilica.

The Roman Catholic Church taught that man was justified by faith and good works. The benefits of good works could be obtained by donating money to the church. Buying an indulgence did not forgive you or your relatives of your sins (only going to confession could do that), but it did shorten your time in purgatory. This was the same as \$100 or 30 days in jail. Purgatory was where your soul existed after death and underwent penitential suffering before the soul was ready for the Judgment.

Martin Luther wrote a paper called the 95 Theses in which he discussed his objections to indulgences. He did not intend to confront the church, only to discuss the issues. Eventually, Luther was excommunicated. His ideas were circulated through Europe and found much support especially among the peasants. He married, translated the Bible into German, which helped to standardize the language, and organized a new church which became known as the Lutheran Church.

He also wrote hymns. The most famous is "A mighty Fortress is Our God." He also inspired later composers to write music based on his hymns. Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) a good Lutheran, included verses in his chorales based entirely on Luther's hymns.

The National Christian Choir will perform in concert on Saturday, Oct. 25, 2014 at Oakdale Emory UMC to benefit the Baltimore-Washington Conference *Imagine No Malaria Campaign*. There will be a 2 pm matinee and a 6 pm evening performance with a reception for persons donating at the Bishop's Circle level. Donation levels are set at: \$20 for Patron (save 2 lives), \$30 for Director's Circle (save 3 lives), and \$50 for Bishop's Circle (save 5 lives). All donations go completely to the *Imagine No Malaria* campaign and are fully tax deductible.

The National Christian Choir is an interdenominational choir based in the Washington DC metropolitan which ministers through recordings, tours and weekly radio broadcasts. They present 12-15 concerts each year throughout the mid-Atlantic area and tour elsewhere in America almost every year and internationally once every 5 years. The choir was founded in 1984 and is under the leadership of Ms. Kathy Bowman. Ms. Bowman is a former professor of music and Music Director at Trinity UMC, Frederick. The choir now has close to 170 voices.


**CELEBRATING WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY, OCT. 5**


