On October 2, Emmanuel celebrated World Communion Sunday by having congregants read Bible verses in different languages. We also used a different style of bread, Hawaiian King bread, for the communion. I am always amazed by the ability of some of our church members to speak several languages.

The following Sunday, October 9, Emmanuel continued to celebrate diversity with a multicultural food festival. 

John and Charles Wesley in Georgia by Kathryn Griffin

John and Charles Wesley sailed to the British colony of Georgia in 1735, arriving in early 1736. John saw the venture as an opportunity to carry the Gospel to a new land, encounter hardships, and experience a new understanding of what the Christian faith entailed. John was stationed in Savannah, while Charles was sent to Frederica on St. Simon's Island to serve as James Oglethorpe's secretary of Indian Affairs. Oglethorpe helped found the colony of Georgia

Frederica was a planned community. But in the beginning, the settlers lived in palmetto huts. Charles held services in the open and prayer meetings in the huts. His health was not good, so he left on May 12, 1736, writing, "I was overjoyed at my deliverance out of this furnace, and not a little ashamed of myself for doing so."

John Wesley served in Savannah and Frederica. He held services on the third floor of a store room and in Christ Church Episcopal in Savannah. John started America's first Sunday school while there and also published the first English hymnal for use in America. He was especially interested in converting the Creek and Cherokee. The brothers were not well received in Georgia, however, because they were concerned with piety and rules. The settlers were concerned with keeping body and soul together in this totally undeveloped colony, dealing with the heat, swamps, snakes (and hurricanes).

The doctor's wife in Frederica attacked John with a pair of scissors and a knife. When that didn't work, she bit his arm and shredded his cassock. Oxford probably did not prepare John for this type of parishioner. John did get along well with the tavern keeper, though. John Wesley left Georgia on December 2, 1737.

He wrote in his journal, "I came to convert the Indians, but oh, who will convert me?"

You can still worship at Christ Church Episcopal. There is a statue of John Wesley in one of the beautiful Savannah squares. There also is a John Wesley tour trolley. The outline of Frederica can be seen. Most of the settlement is gone, but the outlines of many houses are still visible.

SINGING PREVENTS A COLD

The catch — You have to belt it out with other people. Group singing increases levels of SIgA, or secretory immunoglobulin A — the fancy name for an antibody that serves as the first line of defense against bacterial and viral infections. Studies have found that choir singers have lower levels of the stress hormone cortisol and better moods overall, which probably plays a role in the immune system boost. "There's something about having to coordinate your actions with those of others that brings particular health benefits," says Daniel Levitin, PhD, a professor of psychology, neuroscience, and music at McGill University in Montreal.

And Another Health Tip —

The next time you need an afternoon pick-me-up, try watching one of the millions of cute cat videos on the internet. A survey of almost 7000 persons conducted by the Media School at Indiana University in Bloomington found that after people watched online movies of furry felines, they reported having more energy and feeling more hopeful. They also indicated that they had fewer negative feelings, including anxiety. So watch away without guilt!

BUDGET APPROVED FOR 2017

On October 12th, the Church Council passed a budget for 2017. Coming up with a final budget was a long process involving multiple meetings and extensive discussion among the members of the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, the Finance Committee and the Council. The proposed budget was sent back to SPRC and/or Finance several times for additional cuts. The approved budget includes significant cuts in nearly all "discretionary expenses," such as Sunday School, the youth program, and some staffing costs.

A Christian day care center will be opening at Emmanuel soon. Praise the Lord! The Church Council has agreed that this money will not be used for general expenses. One reason we started falling behind in our budget years ago was because we included the rent from a previous renter in our annual budget. When the recession hit and families couldn't pay the school, the school didn't pay us. But our expenses continued. While our new renter is financially sound and we expect to have a long and mutually beneficial relationship, we are taking the following steps to learn from our prior experience:

- A percentage of the monthly rent will go to the general fund, to cover increases resulting from the presence of the day care center (electricity, water, etc.).
- A percentage of the monthly rent will go to the trustees, to be used for additional maintenance and repairs resulting from the presence of the day care center.
- The majority of the monthly rent will be put into a capital expenditure account, to be used when major items (such as the roof or the furnace) need to be replaced. Emmanuel has not had such a fund for many years, and it is greatly needed.

Many, many thanks to Andy Onukwubiri, Beverly Ward and the other members of the Finance Committee for all the hours they put into this effort, as well as to the members of the Staff-Parish Relations Committee for making the hard choices about staff pay.

The 2017 budget will be printed in the next Lamplighter.




Greeters and Readers Sought!
