This is how beautiful every Tuesday morning between 9 am and 1 pm our parking lot looks. A huge Food Bank truck arrives to deliver all sorts of canned goods, produce, toiletries, and diapers that will become part of the more than 150 boxes and bags to be distributed by our food ministry the 4th Saturday of every month. Let me repeat this again just in case you missed it. Our congregation distributes more than 150 boxes and bags of food that can help a needy family to eat for up to two weeks. The number of people who receive food and sustenance from this ministry every month is between 450

and 500. The food ministry has applied Jesus' simple message that expects us to feed and clothe those who are hungry and naked. (Matthew 25: 31-46) The people who receive food come mostly from Beltsville, but also as far as Virginia. Our policy is simple, if they tell us they are hungry we give them food.

While the food delivery is taking place, on the other side of the church--in the Fellowship Hall--you have a group of wonderful ladies who meet the second and fourth Tuesday of the month to pray and send encouragement cards to those in our prayer list. The recipients of the prayers and cards are not just members of our congregation, any name or any need that makes it on our prayer list, gets prayed for. The prayer circle has applied Jesus' simple invitation that no matter how big, small or impossible the circumstances might be, if people request prayer, we pray for them.

And finally, on the same day and in the same section where we store the food for the Saturday food distribution, every Tuesday night between 7 and 9 pm our congregation opens its Sunday school rooms to teach English classes to immigrants from El Salvador, Russia, China, México, The Dominican Republic, Korea, and Honduras. An average of 35 to 50 students come every Tuesday night to learn basic English communications skills. The cost for the entire semester is \$25. One way that we try to motivate good attendance for the students is to give them their \$25 back if they have perfect attendance throughout the semester. I'm happy to inform you that every semester we have students that get a full refund. We are very excited because the English classes ministry turned 6 years old this year.



All these ministries--and many more--that take place every single day in our church make me very thankful and excited to be part of this congregation. I want to take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation for your time, your service, your prayers, and your money that make this work possible. Your financial tithes and offerings along with your work makes the message of Jesus a tangible reality in our Beltsville community and beyond.

Former Assistant Pastor Ben Sloan's Commentary



Greetings from Nicaragua! It's hard to believe that I've been here for two months already. So far it has been a good experience, but I do miss you all. As I mentioned in my last article, the biggest challenge continues to be the communication barrier that comes from my still far from perfect Spanish skills.

Before I came, I expected frustration at times when I'm unable to say what I want to say in the way I want to say it. However, I've noticed another challenge that I didn't expect. I've found that in general I get upset at others more easily here. At first I didn't recognize how these two things were related, but I've come to see that they are. I'm frustrated with myself for not being better at Spanish than I am, and I project that frustration onto others. Consciously or unconsciously I assume that others must be annoyed with me for my lack of fluency. I then become defensive and guarded, often around people that aren't actually judging me at all.

In Nicaragua, Spanish is spoken everywhere. I'm confronted constantly with the need to improve. This was a major motivation for coming to Nicara-

gua, but it also means that I am constantly fighting against judging myself (and others apparently) for my inadequacies. This experience has caused me to reflect on judgment more generally in our lives.

Sin harms us and others. It's necessary to discern what is sinful and what is not in our lives to work to mitigate this harm. In this sense it's essential that we all judge ourselves, but when our judgments become assessments of self-worth, we risk the struggle that I'm faced with now. Our self-worth is not based in how well we speak a language, how well we do in school, or whether we have a job. Our worth is found in the love of God, a love that is absolute and unwavering. Until we can accept that grace-filled love for ourselves, it is very difficult to share that love with others.

Now when I find myself getting frustrated, I take a breath. I try to calm down. I remind myself that I'm the person most concerned with my language ability, and I remember that my weaknesses (and my strengths) are not what define me. I remember the love of God; the love that we all borrow and share.

Even though we're separated by thousands of miles, this month I'd encourage you to try something with me. When you find yourself getting upset at someone, ask yourself if it is because of a problem you have with yourself. Open yourself to the unmerited love of God, and see how that affects the way you relate to others. We're all journeying to perfection together, so if you have a story or insight about this (or anything really), send me an email to let me know.

Over the past month I have been in a flurry of school and work. Between extra time commuting, managing my classes and establishing two new ministries at Good Shepherd United Methodist Church I have wondered how I will ever find time just to rest. Several days I've forgotten to eat lunch and gotten home so late I had no energy to eat dinner. What I've recognized is that I must add a new spiritual practice to my life. That practice is one of Sabbath. With so much happening in all our lives do we take time to breathe deeply and rest in God?

This is the same call that Jesus directs the disciples to before he feeds the Five Thousand. In Mark 6:31 Jesus says to the disciples, "Come by yourselves to a secluded place and rest for a while." 


Thank you for your support of the Boxtops for Education program. We have sent over \$30 so far to the Children's home in Baltimore. More information is on the UMW Bulletin Board.

Prison Ministry

"I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave me clothes to wear. When I was sick you took care of me. I was in prison and you visited me." Matthew 25: 35, 36 (CEB)

I'd like to share with you a very special ministry that I am involved with....Kairos Prison Ministry International, Inc. (KPMI).

Kairos began in a Florida prison in 1976. **Kairos Inside** is a volunteer non-denominational lay-led Christian ministry that conducts a highly structured program designed for use in male and female correctional institutions in the U.S. and around the world. The mission of Kairos ministries is to bring Christ's love and forgiveness to all incarcerated individuals, their families and all those who work with them, as well.

The Kairos Inside Program strategy brings together inmates who have been identified as having leadership potential and those seeking another way of life, for a three and one-half day weekend event of carefully coordinated talks, discussions, chapel mediations, and music led by the loving spirit of the volunteers. After the weekend, inmates are encouraged to establish strong Christian communities within their institution.

I am sharing this information with you because I am thrilled to report that God has blessed us to minister at the only prison for women in the State of Maryland: Maryland Correctional Institution for Women (MCI-W) in Jessup, Maryland. I will be one of the team members serving on Kairos #11 MCI-W which will be held October 31-November 3, 2013.

Kairos means God's special time, and in the lives of these women, we know it will be a very special time for them with God. Your prayers and financial contributions will help make it possible for this very important ministry to continue.

If you would like to commit to prayer (1/2 hour sessions are available throughout each day) please let me know so I can sign you up. We need to keep everyone prayed up through the entire weekend while we are working inside. We have many different time slots that require prayer for **everyone** in the entire compound.

Donations of all amounts are greatly appreciated! As with all mission trips there are costs to sponsor volunteers and inmates for this weekend. Volunteers must pay for lodging and meals. The team goes into the prison from 8 am to 8 pm. We eat meals with the inmates in their "chow hall." Believe it or not we actually pay for the privilege to eat prison food! There are also additional costs for paper goods, Bibles and crosses that each inmate receives at the end of the weekend.

Any size donation would truly be a blessing. Please take a few minutes to remember these women and to prayerfully consider a tax deductible contribution.*

On Sunday, November 3, 2013 there will be a closing ceremony where outside guests, family, friends, & Kairos recruits are invited. An application must be submitted providing driver's license, social security number, date of birth, race and sex. The information will be forwarded to Maryland Correctional Institution for Women, 7943 Brockbridge Road, Jessup, MD 20784 for a background check. The approval process takes several weeks.

If you are interested in attending the closing ceremony, I can provide you with an application and address any concerns you may have.

Volunteers can also support **Kairos Inside** by letter writing, making posters for the meeting room and placemats for the meals. A special thanks to Todd Reitzel for coordinating the Sunday school, which made colorful placements for the last inside retreat during April 4-7, 2013. The adult Bible study also made posters.

Reminder: Only first names and ages are listed on placemats/posters. Church name, location and last names are not permitted.

Thank you for your help as we share the goodness and graciousness of God with the inmates, correctional officers and the prison staff. After all, we want them to come out in better shape than when they first went in.


